On pages 24 and 25 you will see reference to the monthly Jack Petchey Award winners from January to June 2014. All students have made considerable contributions to society and donated their prize money to a variety of areas in school.

On pages 26 and 27 you will be able to read about Sports Day and District Athletics. I am delighted to advise you that some new school record times were achieved. Luke Walton, Year 8, broke the school long jump record with a jump of 4.71m at Sports Day. This was an amazing feat as the previous record had stood for over 25 years. Whilst at District Athletics, Rowan Wallace, Year 10, took the long jump title with a distance of 5.81m, Adam Grimwood, Year 10, set a new school record time of 54.29 seconds in the 400m race and Claude Wallis broke the school record with a time of 2 minutes, 14 seconds for the 800m race.

Many of our incredibly talented students showcased their work to families and friends at our Creative Arts Festival on 12 June, details of which can be seen on pages 36 – 38.

I would like to congratulate our International Baccalaureate students who achieved an excellent set of results, with an average point score of 30, exceeding international averages. Further details can be found on page 39.

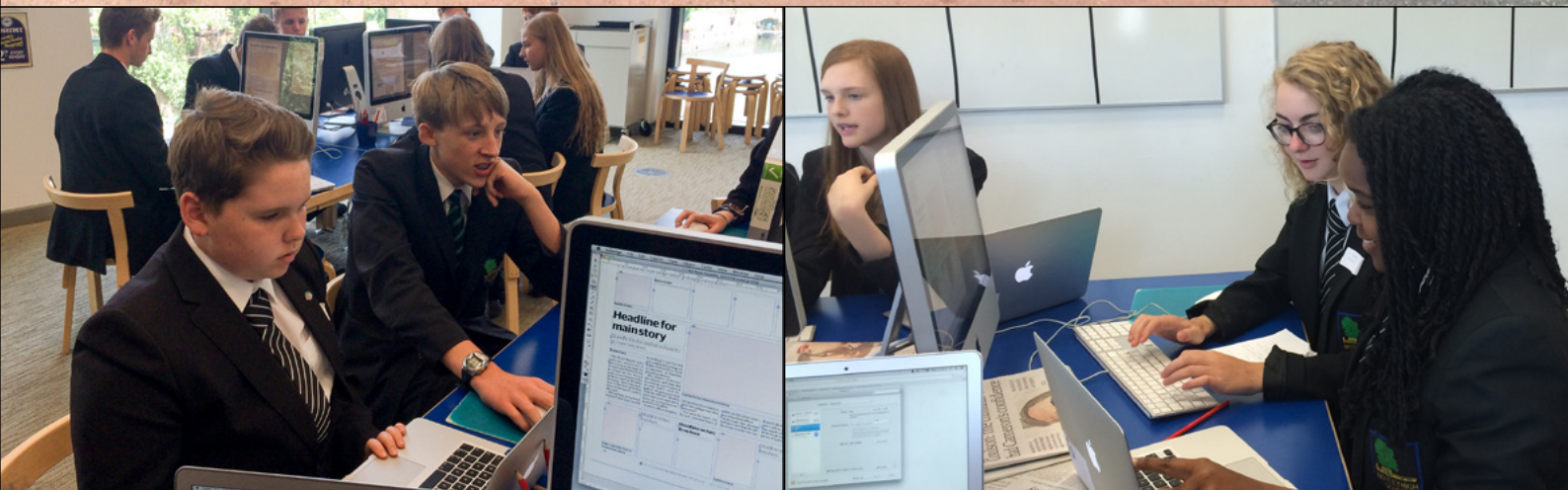


Guardian News and Media Education Centre

NorfolkTrip

Between 2 and 4 July 81 students and 7 members of staff travelled to Kingswood Hall, Overstrand to complete their controlled assessment data collection.



Before arriving at the centre students were taken to Happisburgh to look at this small stretch of coastline with one of the highest erosion rates in the UK and the effect that this has had in the village here. Students also visited a second coastal site a few miles further along the coastline, Sea Palling, where students looked at how this area is defended. Both of these will support students' understanding and help them in their Year 11 exams.

For their controlled assessment, students studied the River Glaven which involved students getting into the river and collecting various pieces of data such as depth, velocity and wetted perimeter. This involved students working in small groups to collect the required data which will then be analysed in more detail when back at school. Unfortunately for some

this also involved some slightly soggy socks as water levels topped their welly boots!

Students worked hard while on the trip and collected some excellent data on which to complete their fieldwork write up.

In the evening, students had the opportunity to take part in some activities which included archery, nightline and fencing.

I would like to firstly thank the staff who gave up their time to come along and help give students the best possible chance for a good mark in their controlled assessment. Secondly I wish all of the students good luck with their write up.

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Normandy Trip

Week commencing 7 July 68 students from Year 10 spent the week in Normandy, for the last time alongside school staff; as following GCSE groups are now to look forward to a diverse trip to Berlin, Germany.

The purpose of the trip was to educate the students on not only the gratified victories of our wars, but also the consequential sacrifices we made, one of them being the great number of lives of which were lost in honourable battles upon the French land and sea.

The trip began on Monday 7 July (avoiding the Tour de France), with a 10 hour journey to Grand-Camp Maisy. Students made their way on board coaches with sullen eyes and eager smiles, waved goodbye to parents/carers and departed just before 5am. They arrived in Normandy, France in the late evening and were welcomed by the staff at Le Duguesclin Hotel. Rooms were assigned and teachers relaxed for just a moment or two. Students began to unpack and settle in. The unaccustomed foreign food was not an acquired taste to most, however students seized the opportunity of familiar foods and drinks when handed out by the teachers every night before bed.

Students were taken to various historical war sites throughout the week starting with Omaha beach, then the varying WW2 cemeteries of the different countries involved in the war, including the American Memorial Cemetery at Colleville, the German Cemetery at La Cambe and also the British Commonwealth Cemetery at Bayeux. Here as well as comparing the different style of memorials to the huge sacrifices made, students fondly searched for possible deceased relatives. Following the cemeteries, students also enjoyed a visit to Point du Hoc, the Longues battery, the Bayeux Tapestry and a 360 degree cinema which enabled students to witness rare footage of the war and the effects of those whom were left behind at home. Students visited the rich historical and beautiful Mont Saint Michel on Thursday, where they wandered

in between active alleyways bursting with French culture and strolled alongside and through the ancient abbeys of the island itself.

An additional bonus of a trip to a local biscuit factory and a detour to the hospital was courtesy of Ms Biggs who broke her finger whilst on Mont Saint Michel. Ms Biggs returned a few hours later with the same bubbly personality and her sore bloody wrapped up finger, fortunately there was no permanent damage made. Students spent their evenings on the Normandy beach outside the hotel with abandoned flip flops lying on the sand and painted toes dipped in the softly teasing sea. The boys engaged in football matches, whilst many of the girls wandered across the sand talking of the day's events. One evening all students were involved in a rounders match, which also included some of the teachers. The results concluded that the girls won out-rightly, although the boys have argued it was a bias result, due to Miss Duncan and Miss Short leading the girls' team. The girls disagree.

After an eye-opening, unforgettable week and a safe journey home, the students who participated the final trip to Normandy would like to thank all of the staff at Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form involved in making the trip very memorable for everyone who came. A special thank you to Miss Duncan for organising the trip over the past thirteen years, tolling up a total of just over 1,000 students who she has taken to the sites which students were lucky enough to visit one last time. On behalf of all of the 68 students, thank you, it really has been an experience which will stay with us forever.

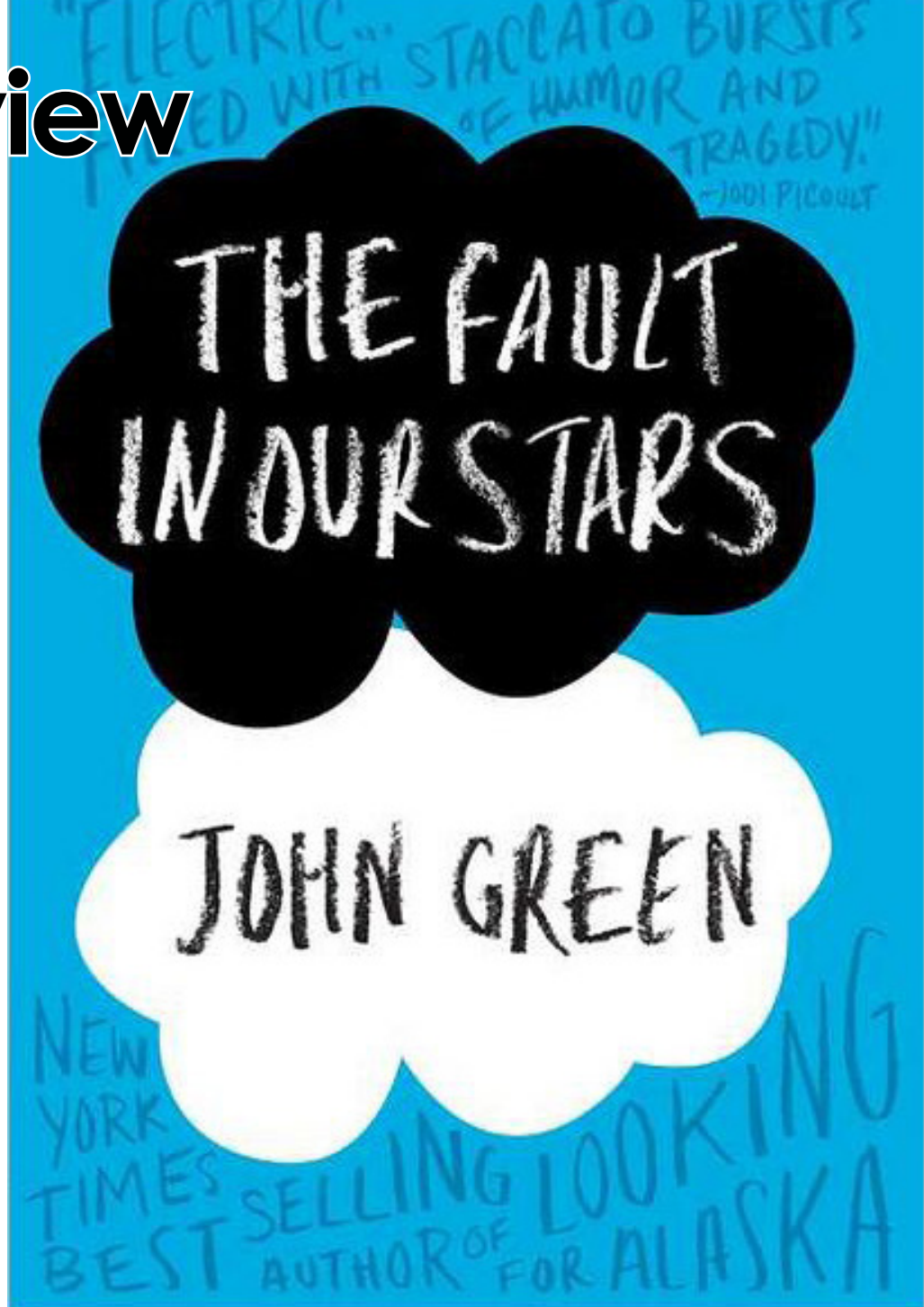
The Fault in our Stars

The Fault in our Stars is a highly praised fictional book which fits into the young adult literature genre. The story is about a 16 year old girl named Hazel Lancaster who has terminal lung cancer. At her local support group she meets a boy called Augustus Waters. They quickly become friends and Hazel introduces Augustus to her favourite book "An Imperial Affliction" and Augustus falls in love with it. He then uses his wish (granted by a charity) to take Hazel to meet the author of the book in Amsterdam. The journey doesn't end though and it changes their relationship dramatically. Hazel finds out that Augustus is hiding a life changing secret! How will it end for Hazel and Augustus and what is his secret?

There are 2 main characters in the book. Hazel Lancaster is from Indianapolis. She has a terminal tumour in her lungs which causes them to gradually fill up with liquid. Due to this, her lungs won't work properly and she has to carry oxygen around with her so that she can breathe. Almost every week she attends a support group which is where she meets the other main character, Augustus Waters. Augustus also lives in Indianapolis and has had cancer. His cancer was in his leg so he had it amputated. After the amputation, he was "clear" of cancer.

There are many positive comments to make about this book. To start, the plot is delivered delicately and isn't presented



in a straight-forward manner which could make the book depressing. The subject (cancer) is a very sensitive and personal one to many people, yet the book manages to tell you the problems many cancer patients are going through without stepping over the line and getting you down. The author is also able to provoke emotions extremely easily through the word choices he makes. This shows how beautifully the book has been written.

Furthermore the plot is unique compared to any of the other

teen-aimed books I have read and has a twist towards the end which you wouldn't expect. Moreover, the characters are very believable because they have distinctive personalities and do things which you can relate to.

This is a beautifully written book that entirely deserves all the praise and awards that it has received. It is definitely one of my favourite books and I would certainly recommend this to my friends.



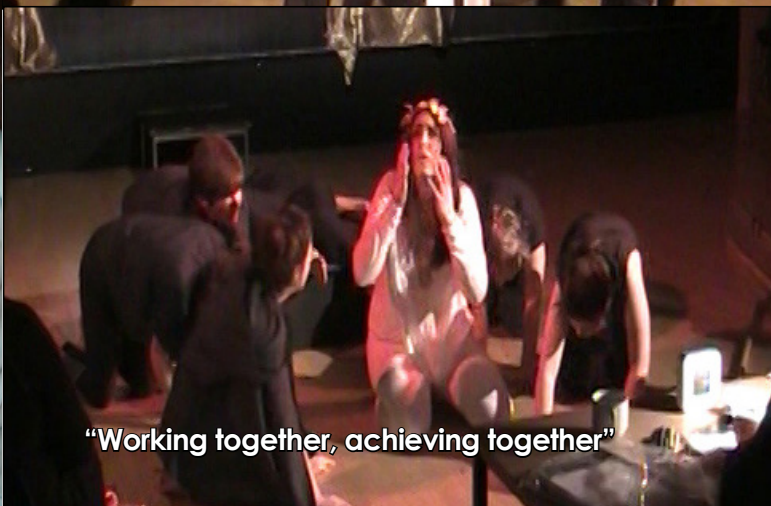


AS Drama Production – Oedipus Rex

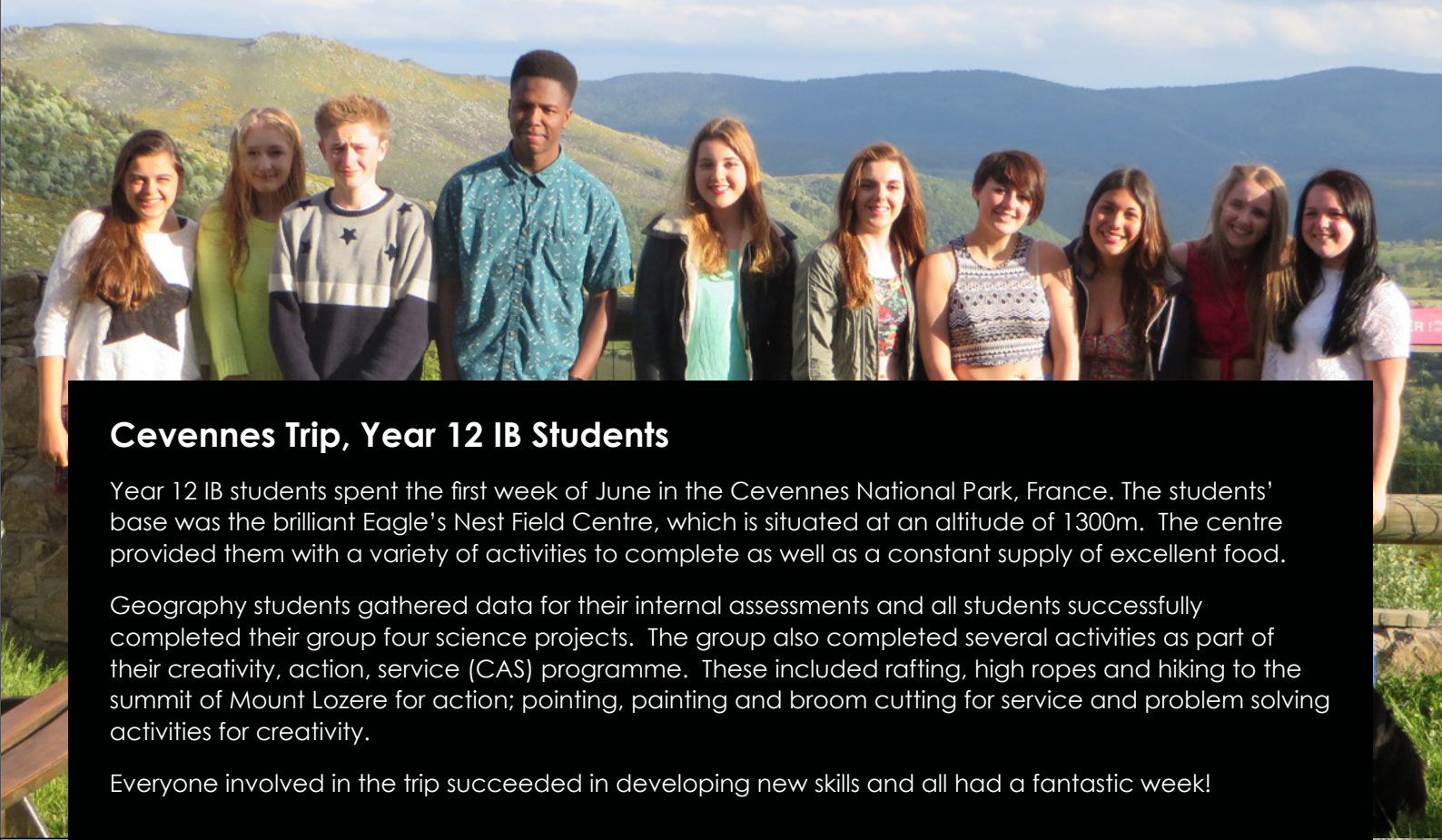

Everyone involved in the trip succeeded in developing new skills and all had a fantastic week!



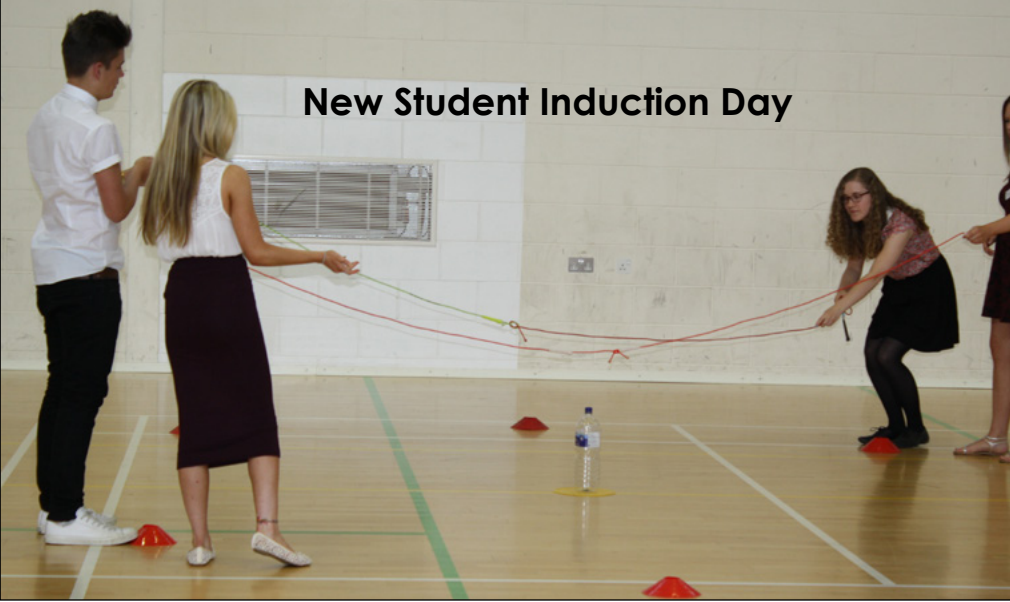
IB Results
